

LONDON BOROUGH OF LAMBETH
CHANGES TO THE ONE-WAY TRAFFIC SYSTEM IN
GLENCAIRN ROAD

[NOTE: This notice is about the extension of the one-way system for all vehicles, except pedal cycles in Glencairn Road, so that it applies to the whole road.]

1. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Council of the London Borough of Lambeth, with the agreement of Transport for London, on 22nd January 2020 made the Lambeth (Prescribed Routes) (No. 1) Traffic Order 2020 under sections 6 and 124 of and Part IV of Schedule 9 to the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984. The Order will come into force on 1st February 2020.

2. The general effect of the Order will be to extend the existing one-way system in Glencairn Road, (between Ellison Road and No. 11 Glencairn Road), so that it applies to the whole length of Glencairn Road, in a direction from west to east (towards Streatham High Road).

3. The Order is necessary to improve the operation of the one-way system in Glencairn Road, introduced as part of the wider Our Streets Streatham South programme of works, delivering a package of environmental and public realm improvements. This will improve road safety, especially for pedestrians and cyclists and improve the amenity of the area.

6. If any person wishes to question the validity of the Order or of any of its provisions on the grounds that it or they are not within the powers conferred by the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, or that any requirement of that Act or of any instrument made under that Act has not been complied with, that person may, within 6 weeks from the date on which the Order is made, apply for the purpose to the High Court.
