CHANGES TO AN EXISTING BUS LANE ON DENMARK HILL

(NOTE: This notice is about reducing the length of an existing bus lane on Denmark Hill. There will be no changes to the hours of operation of the bus lane or the hours of operation of the waiting and loading restrictions within and adjacent to the bus lane.)

1. NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Council of the London Borough of Lambeth on 26th August 2020 made the Lambeth (Bus Priority) (Denmark Hill) Traffic Order 2020 under sections 6 and 124 of and Part IV of Schedule 9 to the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984. The Order will come into force on 7th September 2020.

2. The general effect of the Order will be to amend the length of the bus lane on Denmark Hill which lies on the south-west side of Denmark Hill so that it starts from a point 62.5 metres north-west of the north-western kerb-line of Champion Park to a point 52 metres south of the south-eastern kerb-line of Coldharbour Lane.

3. The measures described above are necessary to improve bus journey times and the progression of traffic through the Denmark Hill and Champion Park junction.

A copy of the Order and other documents giving particulars about the Order (including a map) would usually be made available for inspection the offices of Lambeth Council's Highways Team (Resident Services), 3rd Floor, Civic Centre, 6 Brixton Hill, London SW2 1EG. However, owing to restrictions relating to the COVID-19 pandemic, this is not currently possible and documents are therefore available for inspection on line at: www.lambeth.gov.uk/traffic-management-orders. A copy of each of the Orders and the other documents are also available on request, until the last day of a period of six weeks beginning with the date on which the Orders are made, by email to: bpoulter@lambeth.gov.uk or by telephoning 020 7926 0209.

6. If any person wishes to question the validity of the Orders or of any of their provisions on the grounds that it or they are not within the powers conferred by the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, or that any requirement of that Act or of any instrument made under that Act has not been complied with, that person may, within 6 weeks from the date on which the Orders are made, apply for the purpose to the High Court.
